

Note: Many of you walk the trails in the Broyer Conservation Land, between the PO and Depot Rd. Many of you may not know that this conservation area was dedicated by the Town of Bourne to Clifton Lee Broyer of Cataumet, a Colonel in the US Marine Corps and recipient of the Silver Star, who was killed in action in Vietnam in 1969, at age 23. (We honored Cliff in last year's Village Times.) This land is owned by the Town and maintained by the BCT.

Tree Lighting and Carol Sing . . . and a Fond Farewell

For more than 20 years, George Eckstrom has led us all in song as Master of Ceremony of the annual Christmas Tree Lighting and Carol Sing. It's George who put together the musical program, gathered the singers, arranged for the music and sound system and signed up each part, and led, the favorite "Twelve Days of Christmas." As you know, sadly George has retired from the Post Office and from our carol sing. He is not leaving Cataumet, but after all this time would like to just join in with the crowd. I'm not sure how we ever thank George, for making this event so special for so long, not to mention all that he did for each and every one of us in the Post Office. It truly will not be the same without him.

There are more to thank. Let's start with George's kids, Nathan, Laura, Annie and Evan, who wrote and sang a song to their Dad: Frosty the Postman...it was amazing; the lyrics brought lots of laughter and love; there was not a dry eye in the crowd. Nathan and Evan also sang an old favorite: John Lennon's "Happy Christmas." Also, thanks to singers Stan Carpenter, Gwyneth Packard, Maddie Hjulstrom and Natalie Chambers; the Children's Chorus; John Alden on his guitar (and for the sound system); Bill Fox on the accordion; Santa Claus; and those who painted the festive PO windows: Hilary & Natalie Packard, Livia and Anais Rugh, Gabby Hyde and Mickey.



Goosebusters, a Selectmen's Hearing, Swimming and Shellfish Closures

Last Spring, after some local opposition surfaced to our Goosebusters Program, we sought out community opinion (via a petition and discussions with the Cataumet Club and the Schoolhouse Group). With broad support, I made a presentation to the Selectmen in May on the consequences of geese proliferation locally and nationally (forcing planes down at Kennedy Airport, for example). The major consequences of geese nesting/swimming in Squeteague Harbor are (1) closure to shell-fishing, (2) closure to swimming, and (3) swimmers itch (shistosomes). Lawns and beaches along the shore can also be made unusable. In regards to dog feces, road run-off, septic and fish rack disposal, which are other contributors to harbor pollution, those problems seem to be under control.

Although the Selectmen were not able to give documented support to Goosebusters, they did ensure us that there was nothing illegal about it. Department of Natural Resources personnel offered to help answer questions and complaints, and help us educate people to the benefits of this program.

As a result, we revived our goosebusters efforts, as described in last year's newsletter, using pyrotechnic "screamers" and "bangers", similar to what is used at the Landfill. We devised and implemented a procedure, based upon observation at high tide of macroalgae and geese arrival, to intercept and turn back geese coming to the beach to eat this algae. This past summer we also had swans visiting the beach; they are much more aggressive, leave 6-inch "swan flaps" and have seven times the bacteria threat. Our program worked well and, unlike past summers, we had no swimming closures last summer, although the bay did remain closed as usual to shellfishing from June 30 to September 30.

We continued our 25-year water chemistry sampling and analysis program of Squeteague and Red Brook Harbors and their upgradient groundwater. The samples are taken four times a year; their analysis is done by Envirotech of Sandwich and the MBL Water Quality Lab. The tests are paid for by the CCA and the Cataumet Club. Results from the first 23 years now appear as a chapter in a book that was published in June 2012. The book is edited by Steve Jordan of the EPA, published by Nova Sciences Publishing and entitled Estuaries: Classification, Ecology and Human Impacts. My chapter 9 is entitled Long term nitrate transport through watersheds to estuaries: climate and transient scales. Among other interesting results, it shows no long term (23-year) nitrate or other trends. It also describes a significant increase in groundwater nitrate input to Squeteague Harbor but not to Red Brook Harbor in 2004. The initial response in Squeteague was to increase its nitrate, but after four years the nitrate returned to its previous level, even with the groundwater input remaining high. The Squeteague biosystem seems to be able to readjust to and absorb this increased level of nitrate input at this level. ~ George Seaver

Buzzards Bay Coalition Cataumet Report:

The CCA and the Pocasset Village Association Since 2005 Bourne estuaries have experienced continued excessive growth of Phytoplankton, which causes algae growth. The simple truth of the problem is that the natural chemical balance in the water can get out of balance because of too much nitrogen caused by human waste, lawn fertilizer, acid rain, and car exhaust, along with warming temperatures of the water. There are no better places to walk, for both people and pets, than the local trails created and maintained by the BCT. As you enjoy these meandering and scenic routes, you can listen for the birds and enjoy the wind in the trees. If you see a tree or branch down across the trails, be sure to contact the BCT at 508-563-2884 or send an email to bct.trails@gmail.com and a Trail Meister will cut it up. If you take your dog along, keep the dog under control and off private property; pick up any poop (and take the bag with you, especially along the shore); and be considerate of other walkers, especially when your dog is wet. Trail maps are available at Ballentine's Boat Shop, Parker's Boat Yard, Kingman Marine, Bourne Town Hall and the Bourne Public Library. For 2013, there will be a slight dues increase, to \$15 individual; \$20 family; \$40 business. Special donations are always most welcome!

** Includes all the special donations to Project Playground and the restoration of the bridge, scholarship and other special donations and a \$750 grant that the CCA received from KABOOM for help with the cost of new wood fiber. It also includes a \$675 insurance settlement used to pay for a new section of fence and park bench damaged as the result of a car accident.

Local Trivia: The railroad came to Cataumet in 1872. That's when the first railroad station, a beautiful two-story wooden building, was built and the Post Office established in the Village store, in what we now call Post Office Square. (Prior to that, travelers stopped at the Dimmick's Bay View Tavern on County Road and mail was dropped off and picked up there.) The railroad station burned down in October 1924. During reconstruction, the Station Master's office and ticket office were housed in a caboose parked on the side track, which used to be just

north of the platform. The current Depot, which was rebuilt in brick, was finished and opened in 1927.

With the train, called "The Flying Dude," came visitors. Inspired by the "youth renewing waters" of Cataumet Harbor, the doctors of the New England Society of Homeopathic Medicine and other like-minded Bostonians created the Pocasset Grove & Shore Company, Cataumet, South Pocasset (yes, we were originally part of Pocasset) and around 1874 purchased land from the Swift family to develop a summer community in Cataumet. They sold the lots, hoping to fund the New England Homeopathic Medical College, now Boston University Medical School. Although the sale of house lots was not as brisk as anticipated, the summer visitors of the Grove & Shore continued to enjoy this seaside resort. The legacy of the Grove & Shore Company... a stretch of land along our shore, from Megansett Road to Grasslands, for all to enjoy.
